Unlawful, Immoral, & Corrupting: Censorship and the Lancaster Law and Order Society

Saturday, April 2 2pm at LancasterHistory

For more than 40 years, Lancaster's Law and Order Society made efforts to censor popular entertainment including magazines, comic books, and films. The Society aimed to keep Lancaster a "Clean and upstanding city," free from immorality and vice. In this program, attendees will view items from LancasterHistory's archives and learn more about how the Law and Order Society successfully waged campaigns to ban films and magazines in Lancaster.

Behind the Scenes: The Making of "Urban Legend"

Saturday, April 13

Presentations at 11am and 2pm at LancasterHistory

Join Gregory J. Scott on Saturday, April 13 at 11am and/or 2pm for an author talk on his newest publication, *Urban Legend: The Life and Legacy of C. Emlen Urban. Urban Legend* highlights 25 of C. Emlen Urban's architectural masterpieces, which left an indelible mark on the City of Lancaster. On the pages of this book, Scott shares insight he gathered over seven years of research—collecting from Urban's personal travel diaries, sketchbooks, and linen drawings—tracking Urban's progression and maturity through seventeen different design styles and eleven building types. Enjoy a 60-minute presentation featuring author Gregg Scott to learn "behind-thescenes" information on how *Urban Legend* came to be! Historic artifacts belonging to Urban will also be on display, including Urban's tail-coat, traveling trunk, and a selection of architectural drawings.

Gregory J. Scott is a Fellow of the American Institute of Architects, partner emeritus at RLPS Architects, architectural columnist for Lancaster Newspaper LNP, recent architectural correspondent for Lancaster NBC affiliate WGAL, and twice recipient of the Journalist and Educator Award presented by the Historic Preservation Trust of Lancaster County. Gregg and his wife, Terri, reside in Northeast Harbor, ME, and Lancaster, PA. They have two children and two grandchildren. Gregg's current board and community positions include the Hamilton Club, Northeast Harbor Neighborhood House, Mount Desert Island Housing Trust, and Lancaster County Behavioral Health and Developmental Services advisor. He is also an Eagle Scout.

2024 Annual Presidential Wreath Laying & Ceremony

Saturday, April 20 10am at Woodward Hill Cemetery Join LancasterHistory at Woodward Hill Cemetery for the Annual Wreath Laying Ceremony for President James Buchanan, the United States' 15th President. Taking place in the week of Buchanan's birthday, the ceremony features the laying of fresh flowers at the gravesite of the former president and remarks by the presiding officer of the Pennsylvania National Guard as well as local dignitaries.

On April 20, the ceremony and remarks will include the following individuals and groups:

- Brigadier General Mark A. Goodwill will present the ceremonial wreath at the gravesite of James Buchanan;
- The Lancaster Fencibles will fire a 21-gun salute;
- A member of Masonic Lodge No. 43, James Buchanan's lodge, will make brief remarks;
- Boy Scout Troop 58 will conduct a pre-ceremony cleaning of the gravesite and plant new flowers as well as lead those assembled for the ceremony in the Pledge of Allegiance; and
- The Red Rose Veterans Honor Guard will present a new American Flag for the gravesite and play Taps on the bugle.

Thaddeus Stevens & The Legacies of Reconstruction

Thaddeus Stevens fought for civil rights and democracy in the 19th century, but his impact has been felt far beyond the three Constitutional Amendments that he helped pass during the Reconstruction Era. Join LancasterHistory's Dr. Mabel Rosenheck (Director of Education & Exhibition Planning) and Naomi Subotnick (Research & Curatorial Assistant) for a guided tour of LancasterHistory's latest exhibition "Thieves & Vagabonds" as well as a pop-up exhibit of new historic artifact acquisitions that explore the social movements of the recent past.

In *Collections Up Close* programs, LancasterHistory staff and visiting experts highlight documents, photos, and artifacts from LancasterHistory's vast collections. In a conversational setting, participants will hear the stories of these objects and what they reveal to us about the history of Lancaster County and its place in American history. Ellen and William Craft: A Love Story

Tuesday, April 30

5 - 7pm at the Ware Center for the Performing Arts

On Tuesday, April 30, LancasterHistory is thrilled to welcome *New York Times* bestselling author Dr. Ilyon Woo for a talk and book signing for her latest book, *Master Slave Husband Wife: An Epic Journey from Slavery to Freedom*, at the Ware Center for the Performing Arts. Described as three epic journeys compressed into one monumental bid for freedom, *Master Slave Husband Wife* is a historical American love story—one that would challenge the nation's core precepts of life, liberty, and justice for all—that challenges us even now.

Named as a best book of 2023 by *The New Yorker*, *Time*, NPR, *Smithsonian Magazine*, and *Oprah Daily*, *Master Slave Husband Wife* tells the remarkable true story of Ellen and William Craft, who escaped slavery through daring, determination, and disguise, with Ellen passing as a wealthy, disabled white man and William posing as "his" slave. Posing as master and slave, while sustained by their love as husband and wife, they made their escape together across more than 1,000 miles, riding out in the open on steamboats, carriages, and trains that took them from bondage in Georgia to the free states of the North.

Along the way, they dodged slave traders, military officers, and even friends of their enslavers who might have revealed their true identities. The tale of their adventure soon made them celebrities and generated headlines around the country. Americans could not get enough of this charismatic young couple who traveled another 1,000 miles criss-crossing New England and drawing thunderous applause as they spoke alongside some of the greatest abolitionist luminaries of the day—among them Frederick Douglass and William Wells Brown.

But even then, they were not out of danger. With the passage of the infamous Fugitive Slave Act of 1850, all Americans became accountable for returning refugees like the Crafts to slavery. Then yet another adventure began as slave hunters came up from Georgia, forcing the Crafts to flee once again—this time from the United States—with their lives and thousands more on the line and the stakes never higher.

Dr. Ilyon Woo is the *New York Times* bestselling author of *Master Slave Husband Wife: An Epic Journey from Slavery to Freedom* and *The Great Divorce: A Nineteenth-Century Mother's Extraordinary Fight Against Her Husband, the Shakers, and Her Times.* Her writing has appeared in *The Boston Globe, The Wall Street Journal, Time*, and *The New York Times.* She has received support for her research from the Whiting Foundation, the National Endowment for the Humanities, and the American Antiquarian Society, among other institutions. She holds a BA in the Humanities from Yale College and a Ph.D. in English from Columbia University.

Main Exhibition - Thieves & Vagabonds: A History of Law and Justice in Lancaster County
