Exploring Fraktur: Calligraphy, Folk Art, & Joseph McGlaughlin Lunchtime Lecture Series
Friday, February 7
12 - 1pm

What a sampler is to needlepoint, Fraktur is to typeface. Franklin & Marshall anthropology and studio art student Sarah Kurland-Hill will explore Fraktur as both a calligraphic font type and a celebrated Pennsylvania German folk art. A specific emphasis will be put on distinguished Lancaster calligrapher Joseph McGlaughlin (1867-1942) and his personal belongings that are housed in the collections at LancasterHistory. This presentation and conversation will take place in the Carriage House at LancasterHistory. No reservations required.

Washington Brotherhood, Dr. Rachel Shelden paints a more nuanced portrait of Washington as a less fractious city with a vibrant social and cultural life and engagement among key political figures. This comradery would have consequences for how lawmakers dealt with sectional disputes, especially those involving slavery in the territories, and ultimately lead to disarray.

"A Slave for Life If I So Chuse": Abolition and Slavery in Lancaster County
Black History Month Lecture
Thursday, February 27

In 1780, Pennsylvania became the first state to enact gradual emancipation. The statues, while no doubt revolutionary, were deliberately limited in scope and aimed more at curtailing the expansion of slavery than eliminating it. As late as 1857, Lancaster newspapers still reported enslaved people living in Lancaster County. In his talk, Ph.D. candidate Cory James Young will examine some common misconceptions about northern slavery and gradual abolition, as well as share the stories of several remarkable Pennsylvanians, black and white.




## Here There Is Welcome: 300 Years of Refugees in Lancaster County
