Hurricane Agnes: LancasterHistory to Host Virtual Discussion on How 'Storm of the Century' Shaped Modern Disaster Response

"Playing Politics with Disaster" Author to Discuss Impact of Hurricane Agnes

LANCASTER, Pa. – Though the storm hit over 50 years ago, the lasting impact of Hurricane Agnes still reverberates today. On Thursday, February 16, 2023, at 5:30 p.m., LancasterHistory will host "Playing Politics with Disaster," a virtual lecture on the storm, its context, and its impact.

This discussion will focus on the intersection of politics and disaster, exploring how political decisions impact disaster response and recovery efforts and how Hurricane Agnes influenced the 1972 presidential election which elected Richard Nixon to a second term.

The event will feature Dr. Timothy W. Kneeland, author of *Playing Politics with Natural Disaster:*Hurricane Agnes, the 1972 Election, and the Origins of FEMA. Kneeland is a professor of History at Nazareth College and the Director of the Center for Public History there. He writes about American politics, disaster policy, science, and psychiatry.

Audience members will have the opportunity to ask questions if the speaker and engage in lively discussion during the event.

"We are thrilled to bring this conversation to Lancaster," Dr. Mabel M. Rosenheck, Director of Education and Exhibition Planning for LancasterHistory, said. "Hurricane Agnes was a seminal event for many in the region, and disasters can profoundly impact communities. It is crucial that we understand the role politics plays in these situations."
