The Rich Uncle We Always Wanted

Saturday, March 2

Special Subject Tours from 10am - 3pm

Discover the compassionate side of one of America's historical figures, James Buchanan, in LancasterHistory's upcoming special subject tour, "The Rich Uncle We Always Wanted." This unique event, set to take place at Buchanan's beloved residence, Wheatland, explores the familial devotion and support provided by Buchanan following a devastating tuberculosis outbreak that left many of his nieces and nephews orphaned.

Scheduled for Saturday, March 2, the tour offers attendees a rare glimpse into the life of the 15th President of the United States as a nurturing family patriarch. This event departs from the regular General Admission tours by focusing specifically on Buchanan's role within his extended family, highlighting his efforts to provide a stable, loving home, ensure access to quality education, and maintain the well-being of his kin.

Tours will commence on the hour from 10am to 3pm, providing multiple opportunities for guests to participate in this enlightening experience. Given the specialized nature of this tour, which differs significantly from the general historical presentations of Buchanan and his home, attendees will gain new insights into the personal challenges and commitments faced by the former president outside the political arena.

Advance purchase of tickets is strongly recommended, as space is limited and tours are

Behind the Bars: 19th-Century Female Criminals of Lancaster County & Southeastern Pennsylvania

Thursday, March 14

5:30pm Online Lecture (Zoom)

Delve into the untold stories of 19th-century women entangled in the criminal justice system with LancasterHistory's upcoming virtual presentation, "Behind the Bars: 19th-Century Female Criminals of Lancaster County & Southeastern Pennsylvania." This enlightening event, featuring Dr. Erica Hayden of Trevecca Nazarene University, will take place online via Zoom on Thursday, March 14, 2024, at 5:30pm.

Dr. Hayden, an associate professor of history specializing in 19th-century United States social history, will explore women's experiences in Lancaster County and the broader southeastern Pennsylvania region who navigated through the state courts and prisons during the 1800s. Despite representing a smaller fraction of the criminal population, the stories of these women provide critical perspectives on the intersection of gender, race, class, and law during this era.

The presentation on March 14 will highlight individual narratives and place these women at the forefront of the broader discourse on criminal justice in America. Stemming from her extensive research and her acclaimed book, *Troublesome Women: Gender, Crime, and Punishment in Antebellum Pennsylvania*, Dr. Hayden's lecture promises to offer attendees a nuanced view of the historical intersection between women's lives and the penal system.

The event is free and open to the public; however, advance registration is required to obtain the Zoom link. Interested participants are encouraged to register before the deadline on Thursday, January 25, at 5:30pm. Those unable to attend the live session can view the recorded program on LancasterHistory's YouTube channel in the days after the event.

Dr. Hayden's academic journey, from her Pennsylvania roots to her scholarly accomplishments, offers a unique lens through which to examine these historical narratives. Her work sheds light on the marginalized experiences of incarcerated women, contributing significantly to our understanding of America's social and penal history.
