Four Presidents & A Constitution

Thursday, November 2 5pm Reception, 5:30pm Lecture | LancasterHistory

On Thursday, November 2, join LancasterHistory as we welcome author David Fisher to discuss how the four United States presidents who served between 1850 – 1865, including James Buchanan, viewed their obligation to the United States' Constitution.

All American Presidents are sworn into office with an oath to "preserve, protect, and defend the

Constitution of the United States," but interpretations of that obligation have varied from one executive to another. How should history view the presidents who served between 1850 – 1865, including their successes and failures, in the context of various constitutional provisions, such as its clauses and amendments? Is there a "higher law" than the Constitution and, if so, when should it be invoked? Author David Fisher will discuss these various Constitutional interpretations in the context of the four presidents who served between 1850 and 1865, including James Buchanan.

David Fisher is the author of the *Presidential Chronicles*, a series of books and videos on American history as seen through the lives of the Presidents of the United States. Fisher has a Bachelor of Arts in Communication from Stanford University and a Masters of Business Administration from Santa Clara University's Leavey School of Business. He has held multiple positions in his life, including that of a play-by-play announcer and computer systems analyst. He has also worked for a variety of high-level government offices, such as the Internal Revenue Service, the U.S. Government Accountability Office, and the Department of Defense. He currently works as a Risk Solutions Lead at Guidehouse, a public sector and commercial market consulting service provider, in Washington, D.C. *Presidential Chronicles* is his first book series.

On Saturday, November 4 at 11am, join the Friends of the Tanger Arboretum and presenter Len Eiserer for "Historic Trees of Lancaster County: Part 2." Learn about local, still living trees with

intriguing, historical connections. Trees include those with connections to the 1787 Constitutional Convention, the 1876 Centennial Exposition in Philadelphia, and Lancaster's 18th & 19th-century silk industries.

Len Eiserer received his Bachelor's degree from the University of Maine and his doctorate in Psychology from Bryn Mawr College. He has taught for 38 years and currently teaches at Harrisburg Area Community College (HACC). He maintains the website, <u>Tree Treasures of</u> <u>Lancaster County</u>, and serves on the board of the Friends of the Tanger Arboretum.

Prohibition: The Misunderstood Reform

On Thursday, November 9, join LancasterHistory as we welcome Villanova University's Dr. Mark Schrad who will discuss the reality of temperance as a broad-based progressive movement linked to fights for the abolition of slavery, suffrage for women, and public health.

The 18th Amendment and national prohibition is typically attributed to a uniquely American temperance movement, composed of conservative, puritanical zealots intent on legislating what one can and cannot drink. In reality, temperance was a broad-based and progressive international movement against the predatory "liquor traffic" that subordinated public health and well-being to the pursuit of private profit. Placing the American temperance experience in proper international context lays bare the shortcomings of conventional wisdom about prohibition, and delivers a more nuanced understanding of social movements in both American and world history. This talk will give global context to our new exhibit's discussion of prohibition in Lancaster County.

Dr. Mark Schrad is a Professor of Political Science and Director of Russian Area Studies at Villanova University. He holds a Ph.D. from the University of Wisconsin-Madison and is the author of three books with Oxford University Press, including *Vodka Politics: Alcohol, Autocracy, and the Secret History of the Russian State* (2014), which has been translated into a half-dozen world languages. His most recent book, *Smashing the Liquor Machine: A Global History of Prohibition* has been awarded a coveted *Kirkus* starred review, and is the winner of the Francesco Guicciardini Prize for the Best Book in Historical International Relations from the

International Studies Association.

"Thieves & Vagabonds: A History of Law & Justice in Lancaster County" Exhibition Opens

Opening Friday, November 17

LancasterHistory is excited to unveil its newest exhibition, *Thieves & Vagabonds: A History of Law & Justice in Lancaster County*, on Friday, November 17, 2023. The exhibition offers visitors an immersive journey through Lancaster County's tumultuous history of law and justice from the 18th century to the 20th century.

Covering a vast timeline, from the early European settlers' interactions with Indigenous peoples, to the idealism of the civil rights movements of the 20th century, *Thieves & Vagabonds* shines a light on lawmaking, lawbreaking, and the impact of both on the Lancaster community.

Highlights from the Exhibition Include:

- Two Lady Justice statue heads from atop the Lancaster County courthouse;
- Books from the colonial law library of Jasper Yeates;
- A jury selection drum used at the Lancaster County courthouse from the early 1800s until the 1970s;
- An 1851 door from a Lancaster County Prison cell;
- Two liquor stills confiscated by police during prohibition;
- The service weapon that belonged to Elwood Gainor, a victim of murder and only Lancaster City police officer to be killed while on duty; and
- The black and pink banner used by the Pink Triangle Coalition during marches for LGBTQ civil rights in the 1990s.

Thieves & Vagabonds

The title "Thieves & Vagabonds" is derived from the 1728 petition to Governor John Penn which asked for the creation of Lancaster County. The petition highlighted the challenges of policing distant wilderness areas and the aspiration to instill peace, safety, and justice through the government, courts, and prisons that would enforce laws in the new county.

Throughout the exhibition, LancasterHistory invites visitors to think critically about their personal perceptions of law and justice. Why do we have laws? What is justice? Is justice truly blind? The exhibition and future related educational programming aim to promote introspection and community dialogue on the complexities of law and justice.

How to Visit

The exhibition opens to the public on Friday, November 17, coinciding with the ExtraGive. After November 17, the exhibition will be on display during regular operating hours at LancasterHistory, Monday - Saturday, 9:30am - 5pm. Visitors can see the exhibition by purchasing a General Admission (or Yuletide General Admission) ticket or a Museum Exhibitions Only ticket. LancasterHistory Members visit for free.

The event is scheduled for Saturday, November 18, at 2 p.m at LancasterHistory.

Attendees will have the unique opportunity to view and handle illustrated children's books from the period, pulled directly from LancasterHistory's expansive collections. The program will explore the balance between play and education within these works, how they reflect Victorian attitudes towards labor and empire, and the influence of technological advancements on book design during this era.

The *Collections Up Close* series offers attendees a closer look at specific artifacts, documents, and photos from the LancasterHistory collections. Led by knowledgeable LancasterHistory staff and visiting experts, these programs are conducted in a conversational setting, allowing participants to uncover the narratives behind each object. Through these stories, the items not only shed light on Lancaster County's history but also emphasize its significance within the broader context of American history.
