On Friday, September 5, join LancasterHistory and <u>Strong Towns Lancaster</u> for Park(ing) Day at the Stevens & Smith Center! Park(ing) Day is a global, public, participatory project where people from across the world temporarily repurpose curbside parking spaces into communal spaces for parks, artwork, conversation, and more. With LancasterHistory's expansion into Lancaster City, we're excited to be a bigger part of the downtown community both inside and outside the building that was once Thaddeus Stevens' home and law office!

On First Friday, LancasterHistory staff will be outside on South Queen Street talking about the Stevens & Smith Center and giving you a preview of the new programs we're developing for the new site. Visitors will get hands on with history as they try on costumes from LancasterHistory's education collection and recite key speeches that explore the meaning of freedom in America. It's an evening designed for community connection, historical reflection, and creative expression as we transform a simple parking space into a place for meaningful dialogue about our past, present, and future.

September First Friday is a free event and open to the public. No registration required. The Stevens & Smith Center will not be open that evening for public visitation. All activities will take place outdoors.

"Cursed Are The Peacemakers" Buchanan Biography Book Launch

On Saturday, September 6, join LancasterHistory for the long-awaited book launch of "Cursed Are The Peacemakers:" President James Buchanan, A Biography by Philip Shriver Klein with an introduction by Dr. Michael J. Birkner. The book launch will feature a brief, 20-minute talk about the republication of the book and Dr. Klein, plus a book signing of "Cursed Are The Peacemakers" by Dr. Birkner.

Dr. Philip Shriver Klein's biography on James Buchanan is considered to be one of the most thorough biographies on the 15th President, and the most remarkable for Klein's unique perspective on Buchanan as a strict "constitutionalist." Since the book left publication and Dr. Klein passed away in 1993, LancasterHistory connected with Dr. Klein's family to republish the biography with Klein's original title and a new cover, layout, and interior photographs. In particular, the book features a new, insightful introduction by Dr. Michael Birkner about Buchanan, Klein, and the historiography involved in the construction of presidential biographies and how their writing influences our assessment of presidents today.

The book launch event of "Cursed Are The Peacemakers:" President James Buchanan, A Biography will take place on Saturday, September 6, from 10 – 11:30am at LancasterHistory, 230 N. President Avenue, Lancaster. The event will begin at 10am with a book signing by Dr. Birkner, followed by a brief talk at 10:30am. Dr. Birkner will resume book signings after his talk at 11am.

Rethinking Fall Gardening & Cleanup

Cutting back stems and raking out flower beds may feel therapeutic after summer, but the stems, sticks, and leaves we take away are vital to the wildlife and insects that call our gardens home. Join Master Gardener Adam Barkafski for our September Nature Series program, "Rethinking Fall Gardening and Cleanup" and discover new ways to tackle your fall gardening that have positive effects on the health and survival of pollinators, wildlife, and even the soil itself!

Adam Barkafski has been a Penn State Extension Master Gardener in Lancaster County since 2018. A web designer and former public school teacher, Adam is a home gardener by hobby. His gardening interests began with perennials and later focused on native plants. Adam now gardens with an intention to preserve and create pollinator and wildlife habitats, and observing pollinators interacting with plants are some of his favorite gardening joys.

From Blacksmith To Inventor: The William Chester Ruth Legacy

Blessed with inherent mechanical genius and a family environment conducive to success, African American metalsmith William Chester Ruth evolved his forge in Gap, Pennsylvania from farm machinery repair into a workshop of mechanical creation. Gwendolyn Dickenson, Ruth's granddaughter, and Bruce Bomberger of the William Chester Ruth Legacy Project join LancasterHistory to tell Ruth's story.

Gwen Ruth Dickinson, raised in Gap, Pennsylvania is the granddaughter of William Chester Ruth, and she carries his legacy as an inventor and entrepreneur close to her heart. Graduating from Hahnemann University's College of Allied Sciences, she dedicated over 30 years to healthcare as a Primary Care Physician Assistant. In 2021, after her retirement, she founded the William Chester Ruth Project to honor her grandfather's memory and his accomplishments as an inventor.

Bruce D. Bomberger has degrees in history from Lebanon Valley College, Penn State University, and Lehigh University as well as graduate credits in museum studies from the University of Delaware. He has worked for the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission for 35 years and is currently an archivist with Lebanon County Historical Society.

Main Exhibition - Thieves & Vagabonds: A History of Law and Justice in Lancaster County

LancasterHistory's newest major exhibition, *Thieves & Vagabonds*, chronicles key moments in the history of law and justice in Lancaster County from the 18th century to the 20th century. Building Bridges: The First Japanese Embassy to the United States Coming September 15, 2025

In 1858, Japan entered into a treaty with the United States and Europe, ending the

centuries-long Tokugawa Shogunate that had minimized Western influence. In 1860, a group of samurai traveled to the United States for the first time. There, they met President James Buchanan, First Lady Harriet Lane, and countless American citizens. In *Building Bridges*, we explore the bridge between the two nations through the gifts that they exchanged.

Building Bridges will be on display at LancasterHistory in Gerhart Gallery from September 15 through December 30, 2025 Admission to the exhibit is included with the purchase of a General Admission ticket or Exhibitions-Only ticket. LancasterHistory Members receive complimentary admission.
