

Greetings friends!

Twenty-eight years ago, on
January 1, 1997, I began my service
as the Executive Director of the
Lancaster County Historical Society.
Within weeks of my arrival, we
sponsored our first Regional History
Colloquium, a forum on local history.
Today, that tradition continues.
Continuity is a good thing, but so too
is change. When you look inside this
brochure, you'll discover a host of
familiar—and new—programs and
activities.

One major change in 2025 is the leadership at LancasterHistory.
Last year, by unanimous vote of the Board of Directors, Robin Sarratt was selected as the next President and CEO, beginning January 1, 2025. Robin joined the organization in 2007 as the Director of Development and was named Vice President three years later. She arrived here from the Winterthur Museum where she honed the fundraising skills which have been essential to LancasterHistory for nearly two decades.

As Robin takes the reins, I will assume an *emeritus* role and focus my efforts on completing the Thaddeus Stevens & Lydia Hamilton Smith Center for History and Democracy, preparing it for its opening in early 2026. It's been the



ELIZA PARKER AND THE CHRISTIANA RESISTANCE

In the early 1840s, Eliza Ann Howard fled enslavement at Belle Vue Plantation in Harford County, Maryland and found a home in Lancaster County where she met her husband, William Parker. When, in 1851, a Maryland enslaver threatened their lives and the lives of the others in their community, they fought back in what became known as the Christiana Resistance. While this landmark event is a wellknown turning point on the path to Civil War, Dr. Iris Leigh Barnes, a historian, educator, and the Executive Director of the Hosanna School Museum, joins us to retell the story through the often-overlooked figure of Eliza Parker. 

OPEN THE DOOR: BASEBALL'S COLOR LINE IN CENTRAL PENNSYLVANIA



On Display June 9 - August 30, 2025

When Jackie Robinson broke baseball's color line in 1947, he toppled a barrier that existed nationwide for Black baseball players, including those in Central Pennsylvania. *Open the Door* will tell the remarkable stories of teams like the Harrisburg Giants of the Eastern Colored League and men like Keith Kelley who integrated the Red Roses on the 100th anniversary of the Giants' stint playing at Lancaster's Rossmere Base Ball Park.

On The Horizon: A New President's Welcome

IN 1909, appealing to his fellow architects, Daniel Burnham endorsed the beauty of aiming high: "Make no little plans," he said, "They have no magic to stir men's blood and probably will not themselves be realized. We'll plan the best ways to celebrate America's 250th birthday in 2026 through the lens of Lancaster County's history. And, I will be working with our team on plans that keep LancasterHistory a fun and exciting place to work and visit as I embark on my first year as President of an organization I truly love! I hope you'll visit often, both onsite and online, and be with us for all that's to come.
