In 1895, Pennsylvania passed a law prohibiting public school teachers from wearing religiously distinctive clothing. Although initially aimed at Catholic nuns, the state first enforced the law in 1908 against a Mennonite teacher in Lancaster County who wore Plain clothing and a head covering. Dr. Steve Nolt and Dr. Jean-Paul Benowitz of Elizabethtown College join us to discuss this legal case and the ongoing debate over religious liberty in Pennsylvania. *Free.*


Master Slave Husband Wife: An Epic Journey from Slavery to Freedom TUESDAY, APRIL 30 5 PM RECEPTION

DUTCHIRICAN: A LATINX HISTORY OF CENTRAL PENNSYLVANIA

On Display June 10 - September 14, 2024

Dutchirican tells the story of the Latinx community in central Pennsylvania through photographs and artifacts, including a reproduction casita, or "little house," lived in by migrant workers in the 1950s. The exhibit traces the history of a diverse community from the American Revolution to the present and explores the rich contributions Latinx peoples have made to Lancaster County and the surrounding region.
