







A FLURRY OF ACTIVITY

A Stevens & Smith Center Update

So many tasks are underway as we count down the days to the Stevens & Smith Center's opening in May! December marked a major milestone: final finishings were completed, including trim paint, fresh plaster, and historically inspired wallpapers throughout the house and Stevens's law office. One of the most striking additions is a sweeping 50' x 9' panoramic scrim—printed by Atomic Design in Lititz—featuring dozens of scenes that trace the struggle for freedom, equality, and democracy during

the lifetimes of Thaddeus Stevens and Lydia Hamilton Smith (photo above). From the tense moments of the Christiana Resistance and the turmoil of the Civil War to the hope embodied in emancipation and the first votes cast by freedmen in the 1870s, this dramatic artwork sets the tone for the experience ahead.

In the coming months, the Center will continue to take shape as exhibition furniture arrives, displays and cases are installed, and hundreds of artifacts move onsite

for placement. Media screens and speakers will be fitted and tested, films and soundscapes refined, and exhibit lighting mounted and calibrated to create the ideal atmosphere. Every day, there is something new unfolding, and as we get closer to May 1, the pace of change to the Stevens & Smith Center will be both dizzying and delightful.

One the most inspiring additions to the Center is the integration of new works by local artists across nearly all sixteen exhibition galleries. Original pieces by Keisha Finnie, Scott Cantrell, Philip Thompson, Amy Mozingo, Michael Abel, Kyle Harris, and Tiffanie Andersen Baldrige will enrich the exhibitions by bringing contemporary artistic perspectives into conversation with the region's history. These commissions not only illuminate key themes but also honor the vibrant creative community that continues to shape Lancaster today.

We've raised \$20,228,217 toward our \$24 million goal and the final stretch is here. Now is the moment to join the Campaign for the Stevens & Smith Center and help bring this landmark to life as a beacon of history, community, and civic purpose.
